The implementation gap that exists between 'knowledge' and 'action' in an evidence-based health care context is well known as such, but has.

It draws on a large body of evidence acquired in the course of nearly fifty case studies using data from 1, interviews with doctors, nurses, and managers, as well as observations and documentary analysis. The authors argue that the gap between policy and practices is unavoidable and should be accepted, and—rather than closing it with powerful and generic context-free organisational interventions that are notoriously difficult to find—they respond with an alternative social perspective. The beauty of the book lies in its academic theory.
